Indigent Defense and MIDC Standards For Attorney Training and Requests For Funds For Investigators and Experts

Indigent Defense has seen many positive changes over the past several years. At the heart of a number of these changes are representation Standards which have been established by the Michigan Indigent Defense Commission. (MIDC). The creation of MIDC Standards is a catalyst for the creation of the Macomb County Office of Public Defender and the Macomb County Indigent Defense System. This article highlights two of the eight adopted Standards and describes how they are implemented in Macomb County.

Background to MIDC and Standards

The catalyst for change and the creation of MIDC included the observation that delivery of indigent defense needed improvement. A 2008 report cited by The Michigan Indigent Defense Commission (MIDC) ranked Michigan 44th of 50 States in per capita indigent defense spending, and that there were constitutional inadequacies.¹ This report, the ABA principles of public defense,² other considerations, and the support of Michigan's Governor, led to the MIDC being established as an advisory commission in 2011. The MIDC was made a permanent commission by statute in 2013.³ The MIDC website summarizes the purpose of the MIDC:

The Michigan Indigent Defense Commission shall develop and oversee the implementation, enforcement, and modification of minimum standards, rules, and procedures to ensure that indigent criminal defense services providing effective assistance of counsel are delivered to all indigent adults in this state consistent with the safeguards of the United States constitution, the state constitution of 1963, and with the Michigan Indigent Defense Commission Act. ...

To accomplish its mission, the MIDC established Standards, Rules, and Procedures, which are approved by the Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs, (LARA).⁴

- Standard 1 Education and Training of Attorneys
- Standard 2 Initial Interview
- Standard 3 Investigation and Experts
- Standard 4 Counsel at First Appearance and Other Critical Stages

(The first four Standards were adopted on 5-22-17)

Standard 5 Separation From The Judiciary

(Adopted 10-29-20)

Standard 6 Indigent Defense Workloads

Standard 7 Qualifications and Review

(Standards 6 and 7 adopted 10-24-23)

Standard 8 Attorney Compensation

(Adopted 10-28-22)

Indigency Standard

(Adopted 10-28-21)

Two Standards which directly impact attorneys taking assignments in an Indigent Defense System are Standards 1 and 3. These involve Education and Training of Attorneys and requesting Investigators and Experts.

Standard 1 Education and Training of Attorneys

At the heart of representation of a client in a criminal defense case is being able to competently raise issues, make arguments, and otherwise present a defense. The purposes behind Standard 1 include promoting attorneys' knowledge of the law, knowledge of scientific evidence and knowledge of applicable defenses. Purposes also include promoting attorneys' knowledge of technology, and attorneys having skill and educational programs to maintain and enhance overall preparation, oral/written advocacy, and litigation/negotiation skills. To meet these purposes, MIDC Standard 1 requires that attorneys complete a minimum of 12 Continuing Legal Education (CLE) hours annually. This requirement is similar to requirements of other states and indigent defense systems.

To get CLE credit, the training must qualify. In general, trainings offered by CDAM and SADO qualify for CLE credit. Local criminal defense trainings by the Macomb, Wayne, and Oakland County also generally qualify. If there are any questions about a whether a training qualifies for CLE credit, the attorney can call the Macomb County Office of Public Defender.

In Macomb County, and across the state, attorney completion of CLE hours is tracked. Attorneys not completing 12 CLE credits at the end of the calendar year are not eligible for future assignments. In Macomb County, proof of completion of CLE hours must be submitted to CE BROKER.⁵

CLE training classes are provided at no cost to the attorney. Attorneys can get a code to waive signup fees for CDAM/SADO, (and other CLE seminars), by going to the MCBA website. In some cases, the cost of a training is reimbursed. CLE trainings may be on-site live trainings, virtual live trainings, or recorded trainings. A list of possible live and recorded CLE trainings presented by CDAM or SADO can be found in the CDAM website at <https://cdam.wildapricot.org/>.

Attorneys who have less than 2 years criminal defense experience are required to take 16 to 24 hours of “Basic Skills” training. Attorneys can sign up in the same manner as other CLE trainings. Interested attorneys should contact the Macomb County Office of Public Defender for information about qualifying seminars. These are generally hands-on in-person seminars.

The Macomb County Office of Public Defender works to verify compliance with CLE requirements and

can often assist attorneys with questions about CLE opportunities and tracking.

Standard 3 Investigation and Experts

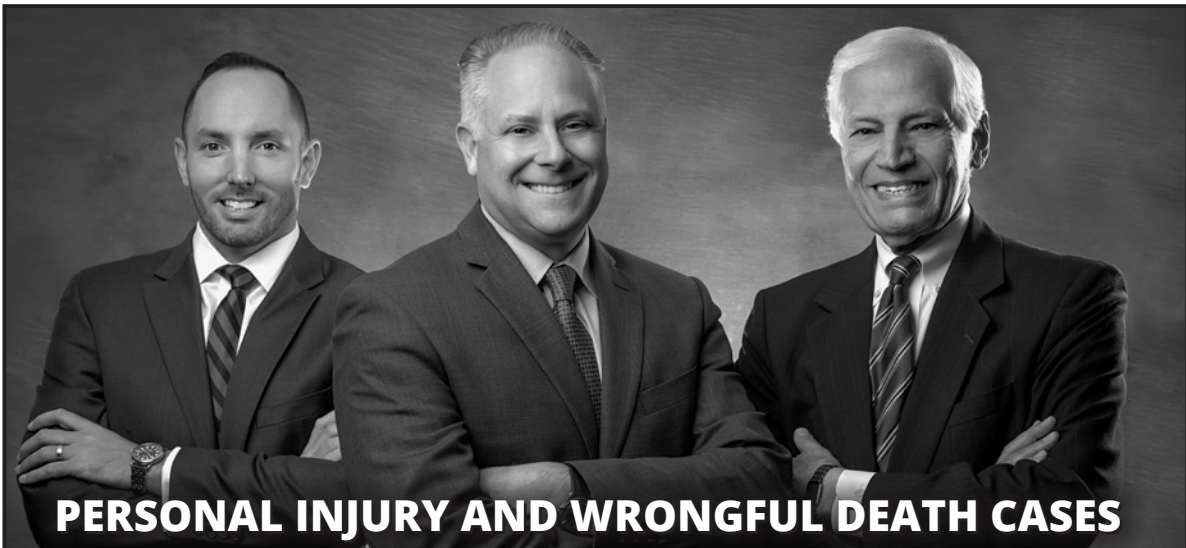
This standard supports and encourages use of investigators and experts in appropriate cases. Prior to the creation of the Macomb County Office of Public Defender, and prior to MIDC, the process for requesting a defense investigator or expert was usually done by motion to the Court. This process is replaced by attorneys making requests to the Macomb County Office of Public Defender.

Investigation is often needed to meet the attorney’s duty to provide effective assistance of counsel and to satisfy requirements of due process. Standard 3 encourages appropriate investigation, free from financial inhibition. In Macomb County, to obtain funds for an investigator, the attorney must contact a proposed investigator, obtain their license number, and get an estimate of the investigator’s time and hourly rate.⁶ Next, the attorney should complete and submit the request form found in the Macomb County Public Defender Website. (<https://www.macombgov.org/departments/public-defender>). Requests for funds from attorneys are reviewed daily, with most being resolved within 2 business days.

Experts can often be of assistance in the defense

of an indigent criminal case. Standard 3 recognizes that, consistent with case law, consulting with an expert may be reasonably necessary to prepare the defense or rebut the prosecution's case. The absence of an expert can result in a fundamentally unfair trial. In Macomb County, attorneys seeking funds for an expert must contact the expert, confirm the services and rate charged, and then complete and submit the request form, attaching the expert's CV. Over time, a list of possible experts has been compiled for attorney consideration. The attorney is not limited to experts on this list. The list of possible experts, and the request form, are found in the Public Defender Website. (<https://www.macombgov.org/departments/public-defender>). Rates for experts are reviewed as per recommended MIDC rates.

A client must be indigent to have a request for investigator or expert reviewed. In some situations, a client with retained counsel may be considered indigent for purposes of requesting an investigator or expert. A Court determination and order of indigency is required prior to any review of request forms for funds for an investigator or expert.

The Macomb County Office of Public Defender maintains the list of possible Experts and Investigators, provides and reviews forms, and processes payment requests.

Conclusions

There are positive changes resulting from imposition of Standards 1 and 3 in the Macomb County Indigent Defense System. Attorneys are attending more trainings for things like DNA analysis, Cell Tower evidence, DRE experts, and use of new Intoxilyzer machines, to name a few. Together with facilitating the use of experts and investigators in order to present a defense, indigent defense attorneys are better equipped to defend their clients and provide effective representation.

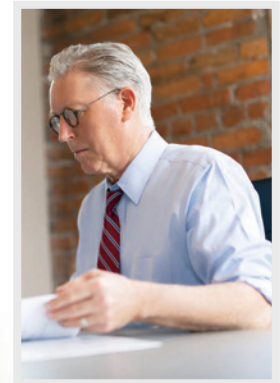

How Does “California Sober” Apply in Michigan?

Michigan Family Courts

“California sober” is commonly used to describe a person who abstains from alcohol and hard drugs, but continues to use marijuana. The “California sober” approach gained some ground here in Michigan with *In re Ott*, 344 Mich App 723; 2 NW3d 120 (2022), a recently published decision of the COA where the family court judge conditioned Mother’s parenting time in a child protective proceeding on her submitting evidence of marijuana abstinence for three consecutive marijuana drug screens. Mother had a long track record of homelessness, drug abuse, missed parenting sessions, and missed drug screens; she had extensive mental health issues.

The family judge’s zero tolerance condition was reversed by the COA holding that the medical marijuana act itself provides that a person shall not be denied custody or visitation of a minor for acting in accordance with this act, unless the person’s behavior is such that it creates an unreasonable danger to the minor that can be clearly articulated and substantiated.

Therefore, an automatic suspension of parenting time for a positive drug screen for THC absent any examination of and determination under these statutory provisions is invalid. Respondent [Mother’s] use of marijuana did not justify the denial of her parenting time with LO (minor child) unless the court determined that as a result of her marijuana use, parenting time, even if supervised, may have been harmful to LO’s life, physical health, or mental well-being.

In so holding, the MCOA expressly found that the medical marijuana act applied to family court and custody matters. Because the case is published, it now binds the lower family courts on the issue.

Michigan Criminal Courts

In *People v Thue*, 336 Mich App 35, 38; 969 NW2d 346 (2021), the defendant was convicted of a road-rage

assault resulting from an incident in Traverse County. As a condition of his probation, the defendant could not use marijuana, even medical marijuana for which he held a valid registration card.

When denying the defendant’s motion to modify his probation to allow his use of marijuana, the district court judge relied on the county-wide policy proscribing all marijuana use for probationers, even for medical purposes. The district court was also persuaded by the prosecutor’s argument that sentencing judges had the power to restrict or condition a probationer’s use of medication.

The Michigan Court of Appeals disagreed, reversing the district court’s decision, citing the often-used immunity provision of the medical marijuana statute:

[A] qualifying patient who has been issued and possesses a registry identification card is not subject to arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner, or denied any right or privilege, including, but not limited to, civil penalty or disciplinary action by a business or occupational or professional licensing board or bureau, for the medical use of marijuana in accordance with this act.

In accord with this statutory language, Michigan courts have invalidated portions of many statutes, ordinances or other laws that conflict with the medical marijuana act.

The Court of Appeals expressly held in this case that a condition of probation that prohibits valid medical marijuana use is unenforceable:

[P]rovisions of the probation act that are inconsistent with the MMMA do not apply to the medical use of marijuana. In other words, a condition of probation prohibiting the use of medical marijuana that is otherwise used in accordance with the MMMA is directly in conflict with the MMMA and is impermissible.

The Court’s unanimous opinion is published, meaning this holding will apply to all probationers in Michigan. All district and circuit courts are now bound by and must follow this rule.

Michigan Judges React Differently to California Style Sobriety

Our law firm has observed how judges react differently to the California notion of sobriety. This dynamic before. Despite a particular parent's past sins, so long as that parent's conduct remains within acceptable boundaries of child safety, then that parent's contact with their children cannot be conditioned on a negative marijuana drug screen.

On the other hand, we have also experienced cases where a parent hides drug-seeking risky behavior behind either a medication prescription or a medical marijuana certification. In such cases, the other parent must be able to detail the misconduct with admissible evidence.

In our practice, the "California Sober" mode of abstinence has arisen from time to time over the past 15-years. Since marijuana was legalized for medical purposes in 2008, our law firm has represented defendants standing before a sentencing judge, trying to explain that they wanted the freedom to continue to use medical marijuana during their probation.

Therapeutic doses of psilocybin is the next big task of the sentencing judge. Most of these judges see mushrooms as the proverbial "bridge too far."

We have extensive experience with convicted defendants who are dependent on alcohol. Some of our clients that are in recovery use marijuana, psychoactive mushrooms, and even ketamine. Of these substances, only marijuana is legal in Michigan.

Nevertheless, these clients consider themselves sober because they remain alcohol-free. Problematic substance abuse and the concept of sobriety have become more flexible. This is the notion of being "California Sober."

Along these lines, addiction experts have noted that younger Americans have trended toward use of weed and psychedelics while shunning alcohol. Is moderate use of these "wellness boosting" substances still considered maintaining sobriety. We recognize that it is one thing to assess sobriety on the therapeutic scale, while it is something altogether different when attempting to avoid violating probation, or running afoul of a parenting condition in family court.

The Crucial Role of SaaS Backups

In the rapidly evolving digital era, Software as a Service (SaaS) platforms have become foundational to the operational strategies of businesses worldwide. What is a SaaS platform? A SaaS platform commonly used could be Microsoft's M365 email. They encompass tools and solutions that are accessed and utilized over the Internet; SaaS offerings present a paradigm shift from traditional on-premise software deployment.
